1.1a Mission

The Puente Project's mission is to increase the number of educationally underserved students who enroll in four-year colleges and universities, earn college degrees and return to the community as mentors and leaders to future generations. The Puente Project has two programs, one on the Santa Rosa Campus and one on the Petaluma Campus.

1.1b Mission Alignment

The Puente Project's mission is consistent with the District's mission and goals in the following ways:

- Advocating for Santa Rosa Junior College transfer students at the Santa Rosa and Petaluma campuses
- Promoting awareness and sensitivity to ethnic, cultural, and gender diversity through our English multicultural curriculum
- Providing a long-term educational plan for each Puente student to help them succeed in meeting their educational goals
- Providing mentorship for our students from a professional in the community to present enrichment opportunities
- Provide students with a platform to explore majors and careers
- Support student leadership and engagement

1.1c Description

The Puente Projects at both Santa Rosa and Petaluma campuses are designed to assist new and/or continuing students to succeed in the college environment. The programs provide three components:

English: Puente students take two consecutive English courses: English 1A, Engl 50 fall term, and English 5 spring term (effective fall 2019). These classes provide a supportive and stimulating environment for students through the curriculum which integrates Latinx and other multicultural literature in combination with a variety of writing exercises.

Counseling: **Puente students take Coun 10 in the fall and Coun 80 in the spring term.** Puente students work closely with the Puente Counselor while attending SRJC, during and after participating in Puente. The Puente Counselor helps students explore career options, develop an academic educational plan and identifying lifetime goals. The counseling component also provides a Personal Development course and the Transfer Process course. Counselors coordinate and chaperone student visits to University of California and California State University campuses and an annual Puente student motivational conference. The Santa Rosa campus program also offers Sonoma County students an Undocumented Youth Conference in collaboration with EOPS to promote awareness of our academic programs and student services as it relates to undocumented students.

Mentoring: Each Puente student is matched with a mentor from the business or professional community. Mentors share with students their personal, academic, and career experiences, and provide a window into "real life" work environments. The network of trained mentors provides many resources for the Puente students, their families, our college, and the community. In addition, Puente offers students career panels and tours to career industries.

1.1d Hours of Office Operation and Service by Location

For academic year 2023-2024 Puente Counselors were available on drop-in basis via Zoom, phone, in-person and by appointment. The English Instructors were available during office hours, familia hours, and by appointment.

As a transfer program, Puente offers campus visits to CSU's and/or UC's. These are essential to the program as it provides an awareness to students of the opportunities beyond the community college level. Unfortunately, due to the rising cost of gasoline the program spent more funds than anticipated on transportation to cover these field trips for the academic year. Both Puente Programs have shared the cost in travel on trips such as the Puente Motivational

Conference. Combined, both programs serve approximately 60 students and therefore, need to rent buses versus college vans.

Annually the Puente Project budgets cover costs for mentor/student mixers, social cultural events, campus visits and "*Noche de la Familia*" in which Puente Project parents are invited and provided information on our college and programs.

2.2d Adequacy and Effectiveness of Staffing

An Administrative Assistant position (or Student Services Specialist) is vital for both programs, preferably bilingual since there are many Spanish-speaking students interested in the program. The program provides many activities and services to students throughout the academic year; therefore, it is important to have sufficient office support to help with the coordination in an organized and timely manner. The Santa Rosa administrative position is not filled.

Thirteen years ago, the Petaluma program was established, and, as the program expands, an administrative assistant will be needed to help with office support. The absence of an administrative assistant at both locations has added to the responsibilities of the Puente coordinators.

Both programs would benefit from having their own part-time Puente mentor coordinator, as some Puente Programs do throughout the state. The mentoring coordinator acts as the liaison between the Puente students, Puente mentors, and Puente faculty, and coordinates and executes mentoring activities/trainings throughout the academic year.

The main use of the laptops will be for center use only so that students can work on such things as online homework, Zoom workshop's and filling out electronic forms (financial aid applications, EOPS, etc).

2.5b Analysis of Existing Facilities

Santa Rosa Campus now has an office in the Multicultural Center and can hold meeting events for our students, mentors, and club activities. However, that space is too small for SR Puente program, and is not a suitable study space for Puente students.

At the Petaluma campus, we are now sharing space with EOPS (Jacobs Hall 109). Space needs some work to get to the vision that we both have of the space. Requests have been made for a remodel of the space.

Recruitment for Puente English and Counseling faculty is accomplished using Human Resources standards. Both Puente Projects support and encourage recruitment strategies that offer the best possibility for a diverse pool. Where appropriate, bilingual faculty and staff are hired to support the diverse Puente Project student population.

3.3 Responsiveness to Our Community

Puente Statewide provides two Puente trainings (Fall and Spring) for continued professional development in both English and Counseling. Additionally, it is paramount for Puente Counseling and English faculty to attend Puente Summer Institute (PSI) on an as-needed basis, especially when a new Puente team-member begins teaching as part of the SRJC Puente Learning Community. University of California Office of the President (UCOP) offers PSI for any new incoming Puente team member(s) as part of its annual Summer training. The Counselor and English Instructor are compensated for attending PSI according to their respective departments.

As faculty we also participate in institutional training and personal development.

4.1a Course Student Learning Outcomes Assessment

English courses (English 1A & 5) offer Puente students an opportunity to work with culturally-relevant materials such as multicultural literature, as well as to explore student-centered and community-based writing assignments. Some assignments require that the student volunteer on campus or off campus and share material they have learned about college to other students.

The Personal Development/Transfer Process courses (Counseling 10 and 80) allow students to explore career choices, learn about the university transfer process, and acquire strategies on how to be successful academically and professionally. In addition, students learn about financial resources for college such as financial aid, scholarships, and loans.

The program assesses student learning outcomes through data that is collected in fall and spring by the office of institutional research and by in-class student evaluations . Outcomes are also discussed at Puente statewide and regional trainings.

The data collected helps to inform what is effective in the program; it also helps to identify areas of improvement.

4.2b Narrative (Optional)

1) The Puente Project strategically includes English 1A, 50, and 5 and personal development classes (Counseling 10 and 80) as a component of the model. These classes provide students with comprehension, composition, critical thinking, study skills and transfer information that are critical to student success.

2) Students learn the core competencies (academic, critical learning skills and social/cultural development) to be successful at Santa Rosa Junior College. Students also learn to develop and achieve their academic goals.

3) Students not only learn how to use campus and community resources, but also learn how to be responsible for their own academic and professional growth.

4) Students are encouraged to enroll in math during the first year of the program.

5) Students think critically and make decisions about majors and careers based on interaction with mentors from the community and on research undertaken in the personal development class.

5.0 Performance Measures

Santa Rosa Campus:

Academic Year 2023-24 has been quite eventful. We have settle into our new center (PAU Center) that we share with APASS and Undocu programs. Students have been enjoying the new space and are feeling very excited to have a space for learning and building community. This year, we invited guest lectures which we were able to afford due to our one-time special funds from Puente Statewide. We were also able to visit a UC Davis, UC Berkeley, Sonoma State, and CSU, Sacramento. At all campuses, our Puente students were greet by campus reps that provided them information on admission requirements, student resources and campus tours. Also, at each university, our students were able to hear from student panels and learn of students college experiences.

Another highlight is that our Puente students created community on campus. In both our English and Counseling classes, they had robust discussions on issues pertaining to the Latinx Community, they study together during our Familia Study Hour, met with me multiple times to update their educational plans, attended mentor panels to learn more about careers and hear of panelist's academic journeys. And a few puentistas started a Clothing Swap student club. I believe all the fieldtrips and mentor events we have provided them this year has helped in creating a positive experience in both our program and the campus at large. Lastly, this year, we also have the opportunity to celebrate they academic success at a beautiful setting and sharing this experience with their loveds one,

Lastly, being in Puente, our students have had many opportunities to be in leadership roles and have leadership experiences.

Petaluma Puente:

In Academic Year 2023-2024, Petaluma Campus Puente project had a year full of academic and cultural experiences as highlighted in section 2.1a of this report . The activities and events help establish community/familia in the program. This helps in the development of a college culture. Students access a number of other resources and support that is presented to them in the program. As a result, many students join other programs like EOPS, MESA, fin aid, and use services like student success coaches and the intercultural center activities. Students also stay on campus and get their homework done. I observed many of them on a weekly basis in the New Student Center, Intercultural Center, and the library to name a few of their favorite study spaces.

The pedagogy that the program uses to promote success is clearly evident by the development and change that happens for students. This is measured by an assignment that is included in their final. They write about how they have changed as a student. What success and change they have seen in their development. Advice they have to offer to the incoming group of Puente students. Overwhelming, students acknowledge the support of the program, what they have learned, and how they have improved as a person/student. This continues to prove that this type of program has relevant and lasting effects in a students persistence, retention, and graduation from SRJC.
